THE MIDDLE EAST Final Project

All students must complete ONE (1) of the following final projects, which will be presented to the class and reviewed for comprehension, creativity, and presentation.

Groups will be assigned with thought given to topic interests and compatibility. Group sizes will range from two (2) to five (5) people.

In addition, each group must prepare a **STUDY GUIDE** for the class that highlights the information from the unit that it used for its project and presentation. All the projects must meet the same criteria and cover the same information, which can be found on the back of this page.

Project Descriptions

- 1) Take the class on a **COMPREHENSIVE TOUR OF THE MIDDLE EAST**. Your group is a tour agency that is marketing a new tour throughout the Middle East. Provide the class with information about the trip including where you'll be going, what cultural traditions and monuments you'll see, and what historic moments happened in those places. Figure out how best to present this information and convince the class to go on the trip, which might include making brochures, pamphlets, videos, or speeches.
- 2) Provide an **EXECUTIVE REPORT** to President Obama or Secretary Clinton about relations between the U.S. and Middle Eastern nations. Be sure to explain any cultural differences they need to know about and how their current form of government works. You might also want to include an explanation of why Middle Eastern government, culture, and traditions work as they do and what belief systems inform those parts of the culture.
- 3) Host a **DEBATE** in front of the class. You should have at least three (3) different points of view in the debate. The debate should be focused on the resolutions for conflict in the region, describing where it is now, where it should go from here, and how best to get to that point. Make sure each person is able to back up his or her opinion. You can perform live or videotape the debate to show in class.
- 4) Create an **INFORMATIVE CHILDREN'S BOOK OR COMIC BOOK** about the Middle East. Write, illustrate, and create a book that tells a story to help children learn about the Middle East. Make sure there is a story for the reader to follow and that you write in language that is both easy to understand and appropriate for children. Be sure to talk about the different parts of life and what conflicts there are in the region.
- 5) Host an **INFORMATIVE NEWS SHOW** about conflict and resolution in the Middle East. Write a script and either perform live or on videotape for the class to see the show. Make sure to include background about the conflict and what is happening in the area right now. Also make sure that you present all sides of the issue and include visual aids when necessary.
- 6) Come up with **YOUR OWN IDEA.** If you have an idea for a project, make sure it meets all of the requirements on the back page and check the idea with Miss Young for approval.

Final Project Requirements 75 Points Total

Content (50 points)

In your final product (i.e. book, report, script, or other materials), you must include a description of each of the following:

- > the land/geography of the Middle East (5 points)
- the **belief systems** (briefly) (20 points total, 5 points each)
 - Christianity
 - Judaism
 - Islam
 - Hinduism
- > at least two (2) vocabulary words (5 points, 2.5 points each)
- the **three (3) main conflicts** with at least **one (1) leader** from one of the conflicts *(20 points total, 5 points each)*
 - Iran
 - Iraq
 - Israel-Palestine
 - Leader

Other (25 points)

In your final project, you will also be graded on the following:

- presentation & organization (5 points) Did you cover all points? Is it easy to read/understand?
- **test questions** (5 points) Each group must include at least two (2) test questions in what they turn in for the final. These questions will be used to help create the quiz on the unit.
- ➤ **group evaluation** (5 points) Everyone will receive a participation grade from their groupmates at the end of the project.
- > personal reflection/evaluation (5 points) You must write a paragraph reflection/evaluation about your experience in this project. More details will be given on a separate sheet.
- ➤ opinion about 1 conflict (5 points) Along with your reflection, you must also include at least one (1) paragraph that shares your opinion on one of the conflicts in the Middle East. What can be done about it? What do you think the U.S. should do?
